

Berry Street School Anti-Bullying Policy

1 Purpose

This policy outlines how the Berry Street School defines, prevents and responds to incidents of bullying, and cyber-bullying.

Berry Street recognises that it is essential to provide a supportive learning community where all students feel and are safe and are treated with respect.

School staff, parents, carers and the local community have the right to teach, work and participate in an environment that is safe and supportive.

2 Definitions

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Word	Definition		
Bullying	Is repeated verbal, physical, social or psychological aggressive behaviour by a person or group directed towards a less powerful person or group that is intended to cause harm, distress or fear. There are five main types of bullying: Covert bullying can be very difficult for someone outside of the interaction to identify. It can include hand gestures and threatening looks, whispering, excluding or turning your back on a person, restricting where a person can sit and who they can talk with. Social bullying (spreading rumours, manipulation of relationships, excluding, isolating) is often covert bullying. Cyberbullying includes any form of bullying behaviour that occurs online or via a mobile device. It can be verbal or written, and can include threats of violence as well as images, videos and/or audio. Physical bullying includes, but is not limited to, hitting, kicking, tripping, pushing, damaging or stealing others' belongings, threats of violence etc. Social bullying is sometimes called relational or emotional bullying, and includes deliberately excluding someone, spreading rumours, sharing information that will have a harmful effect on the other person and/or damaging a person's social reputation or social acceptance. Verbal and written bullying includes name-calling or insulting someone about an attribute, quality or personal characteristic. (Source – Education.vic.gov.au)		
Duty of Care	Is the legal obligation for principals and teachers to take all reasonable steps to reduce risk to students. The duty of care is non-delegable, meaning that it cannot be assigned to another party. "A teacher is to take such measures as are reasonable in the circumstances to protect a student under the teacher's charge from risks of injury that the teacher should reasonably have foreseen." (Richards v State of Victoria).		

Harassment	Harassment involves a pattern of behaviour or course of conduct pursued by an individual designed to intimidate and distress another individual. The behaviour must be genuinely oppressive and vexatious and not amount to a mere irritation or annoyance.
Student	Refers to any person who is enrolled to attend a Berry Street education program.
Teacher	Refers to any person who is employed to deliver an education program which forms part of the required school or course curriculum.

3 Scope

This policy applies to all current students, their families and carers, teachers and school staff.

4 Policy

The Berry Street School define bullying as:

Repeated verbal, physical, social or psychological aggressive behaviour by a person or group directed towards a less powerful person or group that is intended to cause harm, distress or fear.

5 Prevention of and early intervention in Bullying

The School Senior Leadership Team (SSLT) and Campus Leadership Teams will take proactive steps to reduce the risk of bullying which includes establishing and maintaining a culture and expectation of respect. This will be achieved through programs, curriculum and resources for staff, students, parents and carers which explore bullying and recognise and promote positive behaviour as outlined in our Berry Street School Wellbeing and Engagement Policy, and the Berry Street School Supporting Student Behaviour Procedure. Annual review of bullying incidents and feedback from students and carers will inform continued action and a planned proactive response. To prevent cyber bullying, students will hand in mobile phones to staff for safe-keeping and there will be tight control of the use of the internet and other social media in school hours.

The Berry Street School will support children to develop social connections and friendships with their peers, build skills in children to support their peers and challenge bullying or isolating behaviour between children.

6 Responding to incidents of bullying

All incidents of bullying will be reported and responded to in a timely manner. Staff will provide a safe environment for the 'target' and advise and consult with the Campus Leadership Team about the incident. In case of emergency, staff will call 000. Strategies for immediate intervention will be developed in consultation with involved students. The family/carer/case manager will be contacted about the incident and to decide further action.

7 Taking Action

There is no one best action to take in responding to bullying and any action taken will be informed by the nature of the bullying, and will include factors such as:

- 1. Illegality of the bullying behaviour- the school may be bound by procedures for dealing with prescribed or criminal behaviour that involves bullying.
- 2. Persistent or repeated behaviour patterns.
- 3. Single or group bullying.

Generally, expulsion will not be used as a response to bullying regardless of the severity. In accord with the philosophy of respectful and safe schools, Berry Street education programs will adopt nonpunitive approaches wherever possible and will use restorative practices to resolve situations.

8 Authorities and accountabilities

The Berry Street School Principal is responsible for ensuring that the Policy is implemented at all campuses. The Berry Street School Senior Leadership Team is responsible for review of the procedure. The relevant Assistant Principal (Head of Campus) is responsible for monitoring and decisions regarding implementation of the procedures and ensuring that all staff implement the procedure. Staff are responsible for ensuring that they comply with the requirements of this procedure.

In case of emergency, staff will call 000.




The staff will contact the family/carer/case manager to decide further action.
